

### **MONDAY**

<sup>18</sup> In all truth I tell you, when you were young you put on your own belt and walked where you liked; but when you grow old you will stretch out your hands, and somebody else will put a belt round you and take you where you would rather not go.' (John 21:18)

It is not a question of simply *knowing* what God wants from each of us in the various situations of life. The individual must *do* what God wants, as we are reminded in the words that Mary, the Mother of Jesus, addressed to the servants at Cana: "Do whatever he tells you" (*John* 2:5).

(Christifideles Laici no. 58)

Christ's desire for us is to embrace each one as he embraces us, which gives us the fullness of happiness. For the knowledge and love of him gives us inspiration to live happily in the life he had already lived.

But the moment we reached maturity with Christ undeniably we become more argumentative with our very own self.
